
Year 10 – Achievements and Challenges





GCSE English 2019

- No coursework
- 2 papers one based on extracts of unseen fiction (1830 onwards), one based on extracts of unseen non-fiction (1830 onwards) – one tier of paper
- Literature 2 papers Macbeth / A Christmas Carol / Animal Farm or An Inspector Calls and an Anthology of 15 poems – one tier of paper
- Reading and interpretation skills / expansion of vocabulary are paramount for both – encourage wider reading outside of school – online quality broadsheet newspaper / signposted free reading resources on the VLE
- Spoken Language separately graded Pass / Merit / Distinction-small group presentation and discussion in Y11
- Additional curriculum time / personal copies of books for each student / started in Y9 / consolidation in Y11
- Additional 5th lesson in Y9 and 10
- Y11 +0.48 Value Added score in English in 2016-17



GCSE Maths 2019

- Will continued to be tiered Foundation (graded 1-5) and Higher (graded 3-9)
- 3 papers for both tiers 2 calculator / 1 non-calculator
- Additional content in both foundation and higher especially algebra / equations of circles / probability (Venn diagrams) / trigonometry / standard form and vectors now on both tiers
- Maths clubs / Hegarty Maths video clips and quizzes / Churchill Practice GCSE Papers on the VLE / learn all the formulas and proofs / problem solving question practise / new resources signposted on the VLE
- Students need to work hard at understanding and applying the concepts with a focus on problem solving in the exam – it does not just 'happen' in Year 11 although the continuous assessment and drilling approach of the Maths department mitigates against this
- More curriculum time allocated (additional lesson in Y10/11)
- Consistently ranked amongst the highest performing schools in the country for Maths +0.98 Y11 2016-17

- Coursework limited to practical based subjects
- Students on minimum and aspirational target pathways
- Termly tests
- End of Year 10 exams
- Trial exams in January 2019

- BTEC Sport (rugby focus) equivalent to 3 A Levels
- Further Education typically vocational courses such as BTEC / Cambridge Technicals often at College who have geared facilities / resources
- Mrs Naomi Shaeffer based in the school library will see each student in Y10 to help shape future plans
- Entry requirements are now confirmed on the website 5 is now a strong pass and 4 a standard pass
- All boys who wish to stay at NSB will gain a place if they meet the conditional academic criteria
