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## Our Year 9 Curriculum

In Year 8, students focus on texts from the 18th—21st Century, including Romantic, Gothics and Victorian Literature. In Year 9, your son will study a number of pre-complex 20th—21st Century texts written by writers from around the world and will engineer their creative ideas, and analytical voices ahead of the study of GCSE texts.

## The Spring Term (Jan—April)


Year 9 will explore two sets of learning this term: the Dystopian genre, and Villains in literature. Both are used, from a range of extracts, from mythology to Shakespeare, King Arthur to 'Northern Lights', to teach key skills for Language Paper 1. Pupils will focus on key comprehension and understanding of the extracts, language analysis and focus on the writer's craft, the structure of texts and the shaping of language, and justification of analytical perspectives.

## **Discussion topics for the Spring Terms**

- 1. How are characters shaped and developed to create complex and interesting characters?
- 2. What is so engaging about the battles between right and wrong? Light and dark? Good and evil?
- 3. To what extent do dystopic texts give us a glimpse into the negative aspects of our world?
- 4. How are villains used in modern films and television series?
- 5. How can a writer's craft influence and inspire your own creative writing?
