You will sit 3 exam papers at the end of the 2 year course:

Paper 1

Listening and responding to spoken passages.

All questions are in German, to be answered with non-verbal responses or in German (30 marks).

Reading and responding to a variety of texts.

All questions are in German, to be answered with non-verbal responses or in German (50 marks).

Translation into English; a passage of minimum 100 words (10 marks). Translation into German; a passage of minimum 100 words (10 marks).

How it's assessed

Written exam: 2 hours 30 minutes 100 marks 50% of A-level

*Listening AND reading - For one question students will need to summarise in German what they have understood from the stimulus text they have read/heard and marks will be awarded for the quality of German used. Students must write in full sentences and use their own words as far as possible in this question.

Paper 2

One text and one film from the list set in the specification.

One question in German on a set text from a choice of two questions and one question in German on a set film from a choice of two questions.

How it's assessed

Written exam: 2 hours

80 marks in total 20% of A-level

Paper 3

What's assessed?

Individual research project

One of four sub-themes

Questions

Discussion of a sub-theme with the discussion based on a stimulus card (5-6 minutes). The student studies the card for 5 minutes at the start of the test (25 marks).

Presentation (2 minutes) and discussion (9-10 minutes) of individual research project (35 marks).

How it's assessed

Oral exam: 21-23 minutes (including 5 minutes preparation time)

60 marks in total 30% of A-level

- * Research project Students may choose a subject linked to one of the themes or sub-themes or to one of the works. However, students must not base their research on the same literary text or film that they refer to in their written assessment.
- ** Students are advised on the front of the card to consider during their preparation time two questions which arise from the material and to ask the teacher-examiner these questions at an appropriate point during the discussion.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- When you are given hand-outs, please ensure that they are filed in the appropriate section of your folder. If you miss a lesson for any reason, it is your responsibility to get a copy of anything handed out.
- It is essential that you bring your file to every lesson.
- It is your responsibility take good care of the textbooks you are given. They must be returned to school at the end of the course in the same state that they were given to you, so you may wish to cover them. The textbooks are:

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- You will see your teacher for speaking practice once a week. This is a compulsory lesson
 and if you know that you are going to be away you must inform him / her, just as you would
 inform your teacher in normal lessons.
- Use your private study time to develop your independent study skills (not just to complete homework!). Use online resources for explicit exam practice, or for more general information read German newspapers or blogs.

TO WORK ON YOUR LISTENING:

You should select a short audio or video clip from the Internet. Play the clip at least three times and write a brief summary in German (it needn't be any longer than 50 words) with a vocabulary list of at least 10 words. These could be key words or they could be words that are new to you and had to be looked up. Video clips are ideal as they are easier to understand.

Another good idea is to listen to Euronews and transcribe (write down in German what you hear) a minute or so of a news bulletin. This will be really good preparation for the A Level course as well as improving your German comprehension. You can read the transcript below the video to check your work and see if you have heard it correctly. Be mindful that sometimes the odd word or two can differ slightly from what is said in the video footage.

Select an article which interests you, read it carefully and select at least 10 new pieces of vocabulary to look up. The choice of topic area is limitless. It is a good idea to vary the topic area and to choose articles related to the syllabus topics so that you encounter a variety of vocabulary.
